Who We Are

The Kettering Education Foundation Advisory Board is an allvolunteer group, comprised of community leaders, former educators, and business associates. Additional input and advice is provided by a liaison with The Dayton Foundation (TDF), exofficio members, and emeritus trustees. The Kettering Education Foundation (KEF) is a component fund of The Dayton Foundation.

We sponsor a competitive grant program through which Kettering classroom teachers are able to initiate creative projects to enhance learning for their students. On behalf of donors, KEF also manages scholarship funds that award several thousand dollars annually to graduating Kettering Fairmont High School seniors.

What We've Been Up To

Twenty-one teachers have been chosen to receive a classroom grant of up to \$1,000 each. These projects, described on the next page, will be implemented during the 2020-2021 school year.

In May, KEF presented scholarships to 14 outstanding Fairmont graduating seniors, 1 Alter senior, and 1 Oakwood senior. Information about the scholarships and this year's recipients appears on Page 3 of this report.

Since its inception, the Kettering Education Foundation has raised more than \$400,000 and has awarded more than 400 grants. Funds raised have helped the Kettering Education Foundation achieve its vision: to provide support for the Kettering School District's efforts to be an innovative leader in K-12 education throughout the Miami Valley.

2020-2021 GRANTS

The Kettering Education Foundation awarded teacher grants to 21 Kettering teachers for the 2020-2021 school year: 18 new grants and 3 renewals. KEF is pleased to sponsor these teachers for their innovative classroom ideas.

Living Murals: Land of Liberty

Indian Riffle—Kristin Mitchell

This cross-curricular collaboration combines content from art, music, and physical education for students in third grade. Students will create large-scale mural paintings of famous art works. These murals will be the backdrops for performances including music and choreography, matching the mood, style, and theme of the paintings.

Project Lit Book Club

Fairmont—Jessica Dennison

Students participating in this project will have their own copies of books and will gather to discuss themes through a reading community. The project allows for discussion in an atmosphere that supports library guidelines and English Language standards, helping to improve reading skills.

Escape Room Fun!

Kettering Middle School—Melanie Byers

Sixth graders will use problem-solving skills to work together to complete the breakout. This project will help students review and understand different topics related to science and social studies and will provide valuable 21st century skills needed for the work force and for future success.

A-mazing Reflections

J F Kennedy—Becky Brandenburg

Lazer Maze Games will solidify the understanding of the concept of reflection and transmission of light, reinforcing the physical science standards. These fifth-grade students will use collaboration, critical thinking, and engineering skills.

The Art of Glass Fusing

Fairmont—Elizabeth Hann

This renewal grant will help provide materials for students to make pendants and earrings of fused glass, learning about glass and its properties in Materials Science, helping to meet the standards of science and visual arts.

History for All Learners

Kettering Middle School—Trisha Himes

This project will provide books to help ELL (English Language Learner) students learn standards for eighth grade social studies but at a reading level that meets their needs.

IXL Intervention

Ascension—Amanda Lymburner

The IXL online program, tied to the Common Core standards, has skills available in both math and language arts. This program, a renewal grant, helps students close skill gaps, moving them on to the next instructional level.

Reading and Writing for Peace

Fairmont—Darren McGarvev

This new course will explore the efforts of peace throughout the world through writers and their works. Using the catalog of books and authors related to the Dayton Literary Peace Prize, students will explore the writers, their works, and their missions. Students will also work together on local peace projects and initiatives.

Fusing Art and Science through Glass

Kettering Middle School—Lindsay Gustafson

Students will learn about the science of glass and when different types of glass melt. They will also learn how to cut glass and temporarily glue glass in place for the fusing process using multiple Ohio art standards.

STEMming Interest in First Graders!

Oakview—Carly Bach

This renewal grant will help provide materials for students to solve problems while working collaboratively. Projects are tied to the science standards.

Advanced Literary Reflections

Fairmont—Tricia Taylor

This grant provides high-interest, challenging reading materials to meet the rigor demanded by 21st century skills. state standards, and AP standards. Students will benefit through increased reading levels, which will help improve their communication and writing skills.

Family Dinner Book Club

Beavertown—Jessica Hanchak

This project will help increase literacy and improve the home-to-school connection by putting more books into the students' homes, building connections with students and their families while increasing fluency, reading comprehension, and collaboration skills.

Trauma Recovery Unit

Fairmont—Robert Fogg

This grant will help fund a Microgreen project for students in the Kettering Alternative Program, teaching students the science of growing, harvesting, and preparing Microgreens.

Spectacular Specdrums

JF Kennedy—Sarah Smith

Through the technology integration of Specdrums, students will create and make music. This tool allows students who have inner aural decoding delays to hear music note by note at their own pace and will help all students meet multiple Ohio Music Education standards.

Hydroponic Indoor Farm

Indian Riffle—Kimberly Roeser

Students on the autism spectrum benefit from a visual and hands-on approach to learning. The opportunity to set up and grow their own food will provide meaningful context for what they will learn in life science over the next several years.

Reading Is Power!

J F Kennedy—Michele Massa

Decodable texts are important for beginning readers. Ohio's English Language Arts standards call for the students to know and apply grade-level phonic word analysis skills in decoding words. These Power Readers will help students master required concepts.

Breakout EDU Boxes and Subscription

Fairmont—Susan Frey

Puzzle-solving activities for ESOL (English for Speakers of Other Languages) students will help them with communication, collaboration, critical thinking, and creativity across the curriculum. Projects incorporate multiple learning methods and cognitive abilities in one activity.

Little Robot, Big Teacher

Indian Riffle—Beth Frederick

Fifth graders will move from consuming technology to creating it with OzoBots as they code to practice math skills, measure speed in science, and create story maps and graphic organizers in language arts and social studies. The project will also be used to teach coding to a group of second and third grade girls in an after-school club to increase interest and inspire self-confidence in STEM.

A Return to Kindergarten

Fairmont—Meghan Dillon

This project will help increase student engagement with three-dimensional objects in a largely digital, two-dimensional world. Students in art classes will work through a series of guided building prompts to explore three-dimensional form and space.

Enhancing Musicality with

Recorders for All Prass—Colleen Badenhop

Students will learn to read, improvise, and compose melodies on these recorders, supporting the Ohio Fine Arts standards for music. This longer and more frequent exposure to the recorder will result in higher student success in improvisation, composition, and music reading.

Coding Our Standards

Indian Riffle—Deborah Everett

Using technology in the classroom will motivate students and directly support math and science instruction by updating the devices used to code the Sphero Robots used in the physical science unit. This technology will also be used for students in the GEMS club (Girls in Engineering, Math, and Science).
